Chancellor can re-boot UK economy by using carbon tax to make homes super energy-efficient

20th March 2012 – For immediate release

The Energy Bill Revolution, a national campaign supported by over 60 major charities, companies and unions is calling on the Chancellor to use the Budget to recycle carbon tax to make UK homes super energy efficient to create jobs, drive down energy bills, cut carbon and end fuel poverty.

Over the next 15 years the UK will raise on average £4 billion every year in carbon tax from the European Emissions Trading Scheme and the Carbon Floor Price. Recent research for the Energy Bill Revolution has found that if this was re-cycled to make homes super energy-efficient it could create up to 200,000 jobs, four times more than will be created under the Government's new energy efficiency schemes. It could also be used to bring 9 out of 10 homes out of fuel poverty

Ed Matthew, Director of Transform UK, the group co-ordinating the Energy Bill Revolution, said: "If the Chancellor is serious about using infrastructure investment to re-boot the UK economy, he must use carbon tax to make our homes super energy efficient. It can create more jobs than any other infrastructure programme and is by far the most effective way to help households bring down their energy bills."
